## Luyi's Curriculum Corner

Dear parents,

It is again the season for recruiting new students for next year. We have tours and open house events scheduled through early May. We generally start our tour in the cafeteria with a short presentation by Ms. Cindy Moeller, our school Founder, Mrs. Berg and me to talk about our history and our program. We each then take a small group and show them our facilities and classrooms, and finally reconvene in the cafeteria to answer questions.

As I lead groups of prospective parents through the building, I talk to them about how we support our mission and provide an immersion education in Chinese language and culture. I often point out how we separate languages and create a Chinese environment for students' language learning. For example, we ask our Chinese to only speak Chinese in front of the students, and to use Chinese-only print materials in the classrooms. The teachers have done an excellent job of using 100% Chinese to teach.

I have been asked guite often these two guestions on the tour: "how do we make Chinese comprehensible to the students?" and "how do we persuade students to resist the easy path of English when speaking with one another? " The answers to these questions vary from one expert to another. At Yinghua, our teachers use simple, direct language and choose vocabulary and structures that incorporate a large amount of material that is familiar to the learners. They also break down directions and new information into small, incremental steps; use concrete materials, visual aids, gestures, facial expressions, and movements; model every step of the process or the directions being presented. The teachers also monitor and assess students' Chinese usage and make necessary corrections. With teachers' consistent use of Chinese to communicate with students, students now are used to speaking Chinese with the teachers. Unfortunately, there are still times when students cannot resist speaking English with their friends, which is understandable.

Our program is unique amongst immersion programs in that we are able to create a more "pure" Chinese language environment than other schools, which generally offer "immersion classes within a school". We treasure this unique setting and strive to protect it, knowing that the challenges of keeping the Chinese environment in the world of English are abundant! The key to maintain this climate is to encourage and facilitate students to use Chinese everywhere and anywhere in school, and we are working hard on this!

#### Kindergarten-8<sup>th</sup> Grade Winter Clothing Reminder!

Our fabulous PE teachers certainly know how to dress for the weather! As you are outfitting your children, please remember to label every piece of their clothing with their first and last name in permanent marker. We collect dozens of lost gloves, hats, etc. every day during the winter months. If they are labeled, we are able to return them to their rightful owner.
