Luyi's Curriculum Corner

Dear Parents,

As many of you know we are an approved Quality Compensation (Q Comp) school. If you are not familiar with Q Comp, it is a voluntary program that allows local districts and the teachers to design a pay-for-performance system to promote quality teachers and quality education. Being a school with rigor and quality, Yinghua has been approved by the Department of Education to participate in this program for the past four years. Like previous years, to achieve our Q Comp performance goals, we formally organize teachers to be a Professional Learning Community (PLC) to foster a collaborative learning culture, to focus on learning, and to focus on results.

To build a culture of collaboration, the PLC will promote teamwork and ways to coordinate strategies to support students' learning and to remove any barriers to success. To focus on student learning, the PLC will ensure that students learn by addressing three basic questions: What do we want each student to learn? How will we know when each student has learned it? And how will we respond when a student experiences difficulty in learning? To focus on results, the PLC will make certain that staff working together to improve student achievement becomes the routine work of everyone in the school. The data-driven decision will support all students' learning and empower teachers to use various ways to help students. I am looking forward to seeing the PLC make a difference on students' learning!

This past Wednesday evening, I was invited to meet with the

Chinese delegation that came to visit the Children's Home Society and Family Services. Several Yinghua families attended this event and our students were true ambassadors for adoption as they



performed a Chinese song for these special guests. Our students' beautiful singing and self-introduction displayed their cultural connection and knowledge with China. They surprised and delighted the visiting delegates, who clapped and sang along and captured the performance on video.

On Thursday, more than 100 Yinghua students, families, teachers, and board members attended the Chinese Proficiency Award Ceremony and Reception at the Ted Mann Concert Hall. A great number of our students were formally recognized on stage. We are really proud of their excellent work!

This coming Monday, the entire teaching staff will get together at the Main Campus for a professional development session and prepare for the upcoming Parent-Teacher Conferences. Construction Update

Great news on the construction livability front is that the very noisy, repetitive pile driving is complete! Your kids, the teachers, and staff all deserve medals for tolerating that noise for many weeks. The relatively quieter tasks of pile capping, backfilling, underground utility, and concrete work are now underway, with the future gym area being the first priority. There will be periodic activity with concrete trucks visiting the site, but they will be scheduled not to conflict with drop off and pick up.

On that topic of drop off and pick up: because of continuous complaints of Yinghua parents making discourteous traffic-related decisions (i.e., taking shortcuts through alleys, speeding, blocking alleys, parking in alleys, etc.) the city has required us to invest in a Traffic Demand Management Plan, which will occur in October. This not only costs the school thousands of dollars, but it also perpetuates our reputation as an unreliable and sometimes unkind neighbor. Please remember that your DAILY DECISIONS make a big impact on the school's reputation. Please support the leadership team at Yinghua - and follow the traffic laws - by making time for a proper drop off and pick up. Thank you for your partnership.
