Dear Yinghua Families:

Starting next week, students in grades 3 through 8 will take the Minnesota Comprehensive Assessments (MCAs). MCAs, mandated by the Minnesota Department of Education, are administered every spring to students to measure their performance on the Minnesota Academic Standards in Math and Reading.

Students in grades 5 and 8 will also be assessed in Science. These standards define what students should know and do in a particular grade. The big change this year is that students will take all the tests online, instead of the traditional paper-and-pencil method.

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



Hello Parents!

Last night we were honored to host our special guest Dave Eisenmann for a presentation about "Raising Good Digital Citizens". Mr. Eisenmann is the Director of Instructional Technology & Media Service in the Minnetonka School district. He has spoken to parents and students in over 70 school districts over the last 8 years. In addition, he has been an accomplished teacher, is a current high school track coach, and is the father of 4 children ranging in age from KG-9th grade. His presentation showed the combined knowledge and experience of his profession with the understanding and humor of a parent.

The presentation was outstanding! During the discussion he reviewed 8 of his "Top Tips for Parents and Teachers". Some of these topics included:

- Celebrating & Encouraging Positive Uses of Technology
- Proactively sharing your family's values, expectations, and consequences in relation to technology
- Modeling a Healthy Balance & Limiting Screen Time
- Actively engaging with your children and keeping informed of trends and pop culture
- Safety, Filters and Restrictions for Various Devices

Some of the things that I personally took away from the evening were to teach students to "be where your feet are" (not distracted and glued to a screen) and to teach students to monitor what they are posting with the "Grandma Test" (if

Grandma wouldn't approve, you shouldn't post it). I also really appreciated a comment he made summarizing the difference between the last two generations. When we were growing up, our parents gave us the "Big 3" talk: sex, drugs, & alcohol. Now, it's the "Big 4": sex, drugs, alcohol, AND technology. That about sums it up.

After the meeting I chuckled as I overheard Mrs. Berg lightheartedly ask a parent, "Did you learn anything?", to which the parent exclaimed, "I learned too much!" But, as Dave explained, he is only able to scratch the surface of these vast topics during a 90 minute presentation. He admonished us to share the link to the complete list of his tips with all of our families. It can be found at tinyurl.com/CyberResources. Simply type this address into your web browser and you will be taken to the document that he handed out last night. The document is full of live links to tons of useful information for parents and teachers. There are even links to videos of two past presentations he has made to parents of 6-12th graders and KG-5th graders. If you missed the meeting last night, I highly recommend checking out these videos.

ported by National Security Education Program (NSEP). The program funds the study of languages that are important for U.S. national security and economic competitiveness. Their programs are intended to provide support to students of all disciplines to reach superior proficiency by the American Councils for Teaching of Foreign Language standards. The University of Minnesota was awarded a Chinese Language Flagship in 2014, which provides undergraduate students with pathways to professional-level proficiency in Chinese alongside the academic major of their choice. Students who are admitted to the program receive generous financial support.

Professor Allen will discuss admission criteria and career paths for students. He hopes to bring a current or former Flagship student to talk about his/her own career and how Chinese fits. As our immersion students progress in their learning of Chinese, it will be a good opportunity to find out more about higher education and career opportunities for your children.

Speaking of learning, Dr. Lien and I will be attending the National Chinese Language Conference next week in Atlanta, Georgia. We will partake in a panel presentation with colleagues from CELIN, the Chinese Early Language Immersion Network, entitled: "I Love Early Language and Immersion Programs but I Have Tons of Questions". We are delighted to have two of our MS Chinese Language Arts teachers, Yang Lu and Liu Bo, join us. They will be showcased in another presentation called: "Chinese Languages and Leadership Development: Motivate Deeper Learning for our Future Leaders".
