Sue's News

Dear parents,

A huge thank you to you for engaging with us in those all too rare face-to face opportunities to meet over the past couple of weeks! Attendance at Parent-Teacher Conferences was impressive, as usual, and I received mutually positive feedback from parents and teachers. Specifically, parents noted appreciation of the detailed conference guides, the self rating that students in grades 3-8 did regarding character development, and the obvious dedication of our hard-working teachers who have already grown to know our kids. Teachers, on the other hand, really enjoyed getting a chance to meet parents who often share such helpful insights about their children; after all, you have been their first "teachers" and remain critical to their success in school and life. Although the second set of official conferences will not occur until April, please know that teachers and administration are always available for discussion, whether that exchange is by phone, by e-mail, or in person.

Last night the YACA General Membership Meeting was held and those parents who attended were welcomed by Dina Nash, YACA Chair. Ms. Nash emphasized the special projects that are hallmarks of the important work that YACA does. From the wildly successful Grandparents' Day to the current Read-a-thon, the school year is packed full of opportunities for parents to get involved in specific events like the Lantern Festival Gala Fundraiser or in the day-to-day volunteer needs like lunchroom, playground, or library support. Next, Board of Education Chair Jen Shadowens presented the "State of the School", highlighting Yinghua's growth. From the new addition to our facility, which is rising up out of the ground, to our academic accomplishments recently recognized by MDE and the Confucius Institute, we are on the move. While we recognize our successes, the Board and administration also want to acknowledge the areas that need continued attention: a nurturing, yet rigorous classroom environment; retention of excellent teachers; and open communication with an emphasis on listening, to name a few. Lastly, Ms. Shadowens touched on Yinghua's financial status from the standpoint of our recent clean audit for 2012-2013 and our biggest financial challenge, which continues to be the gap between what we get in state aid and the high cost of our program. Needless to say, we look forward to full day kindergarten funding, which the MN Legislature passed; unfortunately, it does not take effect until next fall, so until then we must "mind this gap". Look forward to more conversations about all of these topics and more!

Luyi's Curriculum Corner

Dear Parents,

Last week, while attending the STARTALK conference in Portland, Oregon, Mrs. Berg and I had the privilege of visiting two local Chinese immersion schools, Woodstock Elementary School and Hosford Middle School. These two public schools are part of the Oregon Chinese Flagship, a K-16 program (http://chineseflagship.uoregon.edu/). Woodstock offers a 50/50 instructional model from kindergarten through 5th grade; Hosford Middle School currently offers Mandarin Chinese language classes and content classes taught in Mandarin Chinese. Both programs have been in existence for over 10 years.

Yinghua has had professional ties with these two schools for several years: we have been exchanging curriculum ideas, sharing teaching strategies, discussing issues and concerns relating to immersion education, and working together to find resources. It was wonderful to finally be able to visit these two schools to observe their classrooms and to see the interaction between the teachers and the students. I was amazed to see the quality of their students' work samples and the richness of their classroom conversations. Naturally, I was comparing their students, teachers, and overall program goals with ours, and I am happy to report that we, too, are on the right track to nurture and support our students to reach their full potential in language learning.

At the STARTALK Conference, we had a great opportunity to learn the latest research and development in language learning, the most up-to-date resources, and some of the best practice teaching and learning strategies. One of the important points I learned confirmed our practices at Yinghua: program goals for language and culture should be measured by students' progress toward proficiency. Over the years, we have collected lots of raw data to make sure students are progressing: we use Youth Chinese Test (YCT) to assess students' listening, reading, and writing proficiency; we conduct Student Oral Proficiency Assessment (SOPA) to monitor their listening and speaking proficiency; we also develop internal academic projects to check students' academic language levels. All these tools help us measure students' proficiency to make sure we are achieving our program goals.

In addition, Mrs. Berg and I were invited to present our STARTALK programs at the conference. We proudly represented our Yinghua team and explained to a packed room how to create a target-language only classroom. We shared our experience and answered many inquiries from the audience. Many conference attendees expressed interest in visiting Yinghua, which is regarded as one of the most successful Chinese immersion schools in the nation.

The Storybook Parade is quickly approaching. I enjoyed wearing a blond wig and dressing up as a principal last year. Many parents have asked me what I will be this year. I plan to use this weekend to come up with a cool character. So please wait and see! Have a nice weekend.
