We left fully able to imagine "a day in the life" of these students. I'm confident we can capture that same vibrancy here by allowing our students to help tell Yinghua Academy's story! After all, they can communicate our culture in two languages!

Luyi's Curriculum Corner

Dear Yinghua Families,

This has been another learning week for our teachers. On Tuesday seven teachers (one from each grade level) and I attended an all-day professional development workshop "Teach Like a Champion" organized by our sponsor, Friends of Education.

At the workshop, we studied six techniques champion teachers use to build strong and vibrant classrooms; we also had a chance to practice and reflect on the techniques to teachers' own classrooms, and realized the gap between "gaining the knowledge" and "implementing the knowledge." This workshop offers effective teaching techniques to help teachers, especially those in their first few years, become champions in the classroom. The techniques are concrete, specific, and easy to adopt. Our teachers absorbed all the techniques and were able to ask specific questions to help them improve their teaching. At the end of the workshop, the teachers and I worked collectively and put together an action plan applying two techniques in all classrooms.

As we pondered which two techniques to select, our amazing teachers were reflective and really had our students' best interest in mind. The next step is for the teachers to share their learning with their grade-level peers and focusing on these specific techniques during peer observations.

In addition to this great workshop, all the Chinese-speaking teachers will have the opportunity for professional development this Saturday. Ms. Yin Shen, a veteran immersion teacher from Portland, Oregon, will visit us and conduct a five-hour workshop entitled "Structure an Effective Lesson from a Classroom Management Perspective." Ms. Shen will share her experience and provide concrete and applicable examples for our teachers. The workshop will also allow dialogs amongst our teachers to exchange their thoughts and insights.

We believe great teachers make great students. With the school's mission in mind, we are supporting our teachers to become great educators for our students. Sincerely,

Below are my important announcements for this week.

IMPORTANT! Spirit Week – The December 10-14 Spirit Week has been <u>RESCHEDULED</u> due to the MIA field trips that week. We have also decided to restructure the spirit celebrations so they are more appropriate for younger children in grades 1 & 2. Rather than celebrate for 5 days in a row, we are going to spread the celebrations out over the course of a month of Fridays. The new Spirit celebrations will be January 11, 18, 25, and February 1st – culminating with a Pepfest the afternoon of February 1st. We will send out more details about each day's theme before Winter Break.

Cold Weather Clothes – We are still seeing many, many students arriving to school without hats, gloves, and even jackets. I have also stopped many children from going outside for recess because they were not wearing proper clothing. Parents, please be sure to send your children to school every day with a hat, gloves, and winter jacket. If you could please remind your children that it is winter out and they need to dress properly when going outside, that would also help.

4th & 5th Grade Activity Night – We have 76 students registered for the activity night next Friday, December 7th! Thanks to all of you who turned in your permission slips on time. A number of parents have asked about uniform requirements during the evening. I am happy to clarify that students may wear regular, non-uniform clothes while attending the activity night. Most students will be going home to change before returning to school at 6:00. Those students who are staying on campus from 3:30-6:00 will need to bring clothes in the morning to change into at 5:30. Students may of course wear uniform clothing if they prefer. Remember to dress comfortably for gym games and bring your hat, gloves, and a warm jacket. We plan to go outside to the soccer field for one of the activities – weather permitting. Come ready for fun cuz it's sure to be a blast!

Middle School News Social Studies by Jan Kleinman

In the 6th grade, a discerning question modeled keen thinking. We began our U.S.-Dakota War unit by placing several early American history events into chronological order. By the end of the lesson, we established the following order: American Revolution, then the writing of the U.S. Constitution, later the Civil War followed by the abolition of slavery. One student pensively raised her hand and asked, "But did the writers of the Constitution not believe that "all men are created equal?" How could the abolition of slavery happen so long after the Constitution was written?" This student illuminated a contradiction that historians, philosophers and politicians have been wrestling with for the past 237+ years. Many believe we are still working to achieve equality today. This is precisely the kind of thinking I hope our young citizens will engage in not only in every subject, but for the rest of their lives!

7th graders have just begun their adventure with on-line textbooks. This week students logged in to their individual accounts. They cruised through useful features like maps that enlarge with a click, one click to highlight the main ideas in the text, and audio of all the readings. We are eager to hear what students like and dislike about this new delivery system. Of course, the bottom line is whether students learn well. So far, students eagerly explored the on line book. I wonder how they are liking doing their homework?

Another memorable moment occurred in the 8th grade this past week. We began an economics lesson about comparative advantage. The lesson's title caught the students' attention and elicited smiles and cries of "Yummy;" it is called "Lemonade and Cookies." Later that first day, one 8th grader mentioned about our class, "I like this!" "Oh, you like to eat cookies and drink lemonade?" I asked. "No, I like the lesson," clarified the student. A moment a Social Studies teacher will remember forever!


Lexia Successes
